NHS Funding

The Government is not telling the truth when it says it plans to spend £10 billion more a year on the NHS by 2020. The true figure is £4.5 billion. That is not enough to keep up with growing health care needs.

This decade (2010-2020) sees the largest ever sustained reduction in UK NHS spending as a percentage of GDP.

The NHS will see an annual rise of 1.1% between 2010 and 2020, but this falls to a 0.1% annual rise when population growth is taken into account. This is the lowest average annual change of any decade and does not meet the growth in need for health services of 3% each year due to medical advances and ageing population.

Affordability of the NHS

The NHS is not unaffordable or unsustainable. It's underfunded:

Private hospitals

Profits in private hospital chains Spire and BMI have been rising strongly as a result of increased NHS contracts to treat patients in otherwise empty beds.

From October 2010-April 2014 802 patients died unexpectedly in private hospitals, & there were 921 serious injuries: http://t.co/mSwYouoVkF

Costs of the market

Collapsed contracts to privatise services for older people in Cambridgeshire and cancer care in Staffordshire have wasted millions. Meanwhile as NHS trust deficits increase, almost half the £2bn extra funding for NHS commissioning in 2015/16 went to non-NHS providers. On average £1 in every £8 of local commissioners' budgets is now spent on care from non-NHS organisations."

NHS Performance

A+E

The number of people attending A+E who are seen and treated within 4 hours has dropped from 97% in 2010 to 83% in 2017.

Trolley waits

In February 2017 54,492 people waited on trolleys for a hospital bed, compared with 7,872 in February 2011 – a seven-fold increase over just six years.

Ambulances

Ambulance service has not met its target of responding to 25% of urgent calls within 8 minutes since 2013/14. Recent performance is the worst it has ever been with over 30% of urgent calls not responded to in less than 8 minutes.

Treatment Waiting times

The proportion of patients waiting more than 18 weeks to begin their treatment increased to more than 10 per cent in December 2016 which is the worst performance since the standard was introduced in 2012.

At the end of December 2016, 6,191 patients were delayed in hospitals. This is the highest number for this time of year since the data began and is an increase of 24 per cent since December 2015.

The costs of maintaining market mechanisms in the NHS have been estimated as at least £4.5 billion a year – enough to pay for either ten specialist hospitals, 174,798 extra nurses, 42,413 extra GPs, or 39,473,684 extra patient visits to A&E.

PFI

Staffing

UK has far fewer nurses, doctors and beds per thousand people than the Western European average. OECD data.

GPs

Between September 2015 and December 2016, the number of GPs fell by 542 (1.6%).
